New York, 7:45 p. m.—Deputy County Clerk Battle made this announcement to the New York Board of Canvassers: "The Board of Canvassers have completed the canvass of 312 election districts in the city of New York. As to the district the first of the eighteenth, it is necessary for inspectors to be required to correct the returns as to error supposed to be present on the face of returns. That returns gives to the Blaine electors 24, while from other statements it appears it ought to be 21. This can make a difference of 27 votes, or more to Grover. If these votes are allowed Blaine, the result will be that the lowest Elector on the Cleveland ticket will have 138,377 in New York City, the highest on the Blaine ticket 99,000. Plurality for the lowest Cleveland Electors 13,954."

New York, Nov. 16.—A hasty computation of the clerk in charge of the city returns, the canvass of which has just been completed, gives Cleveland a plurality of 1,117 in the entire state. Blaine's net gain in the city by canvass was 120.
